



# HISTORICAL BACKGROUND OF THE SWADESHI MOVEMENT AND THE CONTEMPORARY 'MAKE IN INDIA' INITIATIVE

## ABSTRACT

This research paper examines the historical background and relationship between the Swadeshi Movement and the contemporary "Make in India" initiative in India. The Swadeshi Movement emerged during the freedom struggle as an economic and nationalist movement promoting indigenous goods and discouraging foreign products. It gained prominence during the anti-Partition of Bengal movement in 1905 and encouraged self-reliance. In modern times, the Government of India launched the "Make in India" initiative in 2014 to promote manufacturing, attract investment, and generate employment. This study uses a historical and analytical approach to compare both initiatives. It finds that despite differences in context, both aim to strengthen economic self-reliance and promote domestic production in India.

The main objective of this movement was to boycott foreign goods, promote indigenous industries, and develop a sense of economic self-reliance among the people. Several national leaders such as Mahatma Gandhi, Bal Gangadhar Tilak, Lala Lajpat Rai, and Rabindranath Tagore played a crucial role in spreading the idea of Swadeshi among the masses. The movement encouraged Indian industries, cottage industries, and handicrafts, and inspired people to have confidence in the country's productive capacity. Even after independence, the concept of self-reliance and promotion of domestic production continued to remain significant in India's economic policies.

Extending this ideology into the modern context, the Government of India launched the "Make in India" initiative in 2014. The objective of this initiative is to develop India as a strong global manufacturing hub, attract foreign investment, strengthen domestic industries, and generate large-scale employment opportunities (Naik, 2019). Although "Make in India" is based on modern technology, innovation, and global competitiveness, its core philosophy reflects the same spirit of self-reliance and indigenous production that was evident during the Swadeshi Movement. Thus, a historical and ideological connection can be observed between the Swadeshi Movement and the "Make in India" initiative. The main objective of this research paper is to study the historical background of the Swadeshi Movement and to understand how its ideology is reflected in the contemporary "Make in India" initiative. The

study also presents a comparative analysis of the objectives, approaches, and socio-economic impacts of both initiatives.

## LITERATURE REVIEW

Several historians and researchers have studied the Swadeshi Movement and the idea of economic self-reliance in India. These studies indicate that the Swadeshi Movement was not merely a political movement but was also deeply associated with economic nationalism and the spirit of self-reliance. Renowned historian Bipan Chandra, in his book *India's Struggle for Independence*, states that the Swadeshi Movement was a significant phase of the Indian freedom struggle, which promoted the boycott of foreign goods and the development of indigenous industries (Chandra, 1989). According to him, the movement strengthened economic nationalism and national consciousness in Indian society.

Similarly, Sumit Sarkar, in his book *The Swadeshi Movement in Bengal 1903–1908*, provides a detailed analysis of the historical development and socio-economic impact of the movement. He explains that the movement, which began as a protest against the Partition of Bengal, gradually spread across the country and fostered a sense of self-reliance among the people (Sarkar, 1973).

Sekhar Bandyopadhyay, in *From Plassey to Partition and After*, examines the growth of Indian nationalism and identifies the Swadeshi Movement as an important example of economic nationalism. According to him, the movement played a crucial role in promoting Indian industries and local production (Bandyopadhyay, 2004).

In addition, Tara Chand, in *History of the Freedom Movement in India*, highlights that the Swadeshi Movement strengthened national unity and self-respect among Indians (Chand, 1988).

In the modern context, several scholars have analyzed the "Make in India" initiative. For instance, Shekhar Naik, in his study *Genesis of Make in India: A Study of Swadeshi*



*Movement*, argues that the ideology of “Make in India” is closely linked to the historical thought of the Swadeshi Movement (Naik, 2019). According to this study, both initiatives aim to promote domestic production and strengthen economic self-reliance in India.

These studies clearly indicate that both the Swadeshi Movement and the “Make in India” initiative are important in the context of India’s economic self-reliance and industrial development. However, there is still a need for further research on the historical relationship and ideological continuity between the two. This forms the main objective of the present study.

### RESEARCH METHODOLOGY

This research paper adopts a qualitative and historical-analytical research methodology. The primary objective of the study is to analyze the historical background of the Swadeshi Movement and to understand how its ideology is reflected in the contemporary “Make in India” initiative in India. The study is mainly based on secondary sources. It includes an analysis of books by various historians, research papers, government reports, and academic articles. Additionally, government documents and research studies related to the “Make in India” initiative have also been examined. This study employs both descriptive and comparative methods. The descriptive method is used to present the historical background, objectives, and features of the Swadeshi Movement and the “Make in India” initiative. The comparative method is used to analyze the similarities and differences between the two initiatives.

The main objective of this movement was to boycott foreign goods and promote the use of indigenous products (Bandyopadhyay, 2004). People were encouraged to stop using British goods and instead adopt Indian textiles and local products. In many places, foreign clothes were publicly burned as a symbol of boycott. Along with this, efforts were made to promote Indian industries, cottage industries, and handicrafts.

Several prominent national leaders played an important role in the Swadeshi Movement. Leaders such as Bal Gangadhar Tilak, Lala Lajpat Rai, Bipin Chandra Pal, and Rabindranath Tagore inspired people to adopt Swadeshi goods. Through their speeches, writings, and social activities, they spread national awareness among the masses. Later, Mahatma Gandhi also promoted the idea of Swadeshi and emphasized khadi and cottage industries as the foundation of a self-reliant India. The impact of the Swadeshi Movement was not limited to the economic sphere but also extended to social and educational fields. During this period, several national educational institutions were established with the aim of providing education based on Indian values and culture. The movement also strengthened self-confidence and self-respect among the people. Furthermore, the Swadeshi Movement contributed significantly to the development of Indian industries. People began supporting local industries, handicrafts, and small businesses, which gave a new direction to the Indian economy. It also created a sense of belief among people that India could become self-reliant through its own resources and labor. Thus, the Swadeshi Movement was not merely a boycott of foreign goods but a crucial step toward India’s economic independence and self-reliance. It strengthened the spirit of indigenous production, local industries, and national pride in Indian society. This ideology later influenced modern economic policies in India, and its reflection can be seen in initiatives such as “Make in India.” Therefore, it can be concluded that the spirit of self-reliance generated by the Swadeshi Movement continues to play an important role in India’s economic development and policies even today.
