REVIEW OF LITERATURE

The evolution of gender discourse within sociological literature has been overwhelmingly defined by a linear, wave-based progression, transitioning from fundamental legal adjustments to highly atomized digital and identity-based activism. While this trajectory has successfully exposed structural disparities, a critical examination reveals significant epistemological limitations.

This literature review evaluates the core tenets of the conventional waves of feminism (contextualized in image 1000173618.jpg), identifies their structural and geographic blind spots, and introduces **The Umbarkar Theory of Unified Global Determinism (UTGD)** as a macro-sociological corrective.

1. The First Wave (1848–1920s): Legal Suffrage and the Foundation of Liberal Individualism

The foundational era of gender advocacy focused primarily on de jure (legal) inequalities, specifically demanding women's suffrage, property rights, and access to education. Early political philosophers and activists, such as Mary Wollstonecraft (*A Vindication of the Rights of Woman*, 1792) and Elizabeth Cady Stanton, argued that social progress required extending Enlightenment principles of individual liberty and equal citizenship to women.

Influenced by neo-Marxist conflict theories, key thinkers like Simone de Beauvoir (*The Second Sex*, 1949) argued that womanhood was a social construct designed to serve male dominance, famously declaring, "*One is not born, but rather becomes a woman.*" Betty Friedan (*The Feminine Mystique*, 1963) diagnosed the private home as a site of systemic stagnation—the "problem that has no name"—while Kate Millett (*Sexual Politics*, 1970) institutionalized the political critique of the traditional family, coining and popularizing the foundational maxim: "*The personal is political.*"

Concurrently, bell hooks (*Feminist Theory: From Margin to Center*, 1984) challenged the white, middle-class bias of mainstream sociology, while post-structuralist theorists like Judith Butler (*Gender Trouble*, 1990) deconstructed the biological basis of sex entirely, positing that gender is merely a fluid, performative social act rather than a fixed biological reality.

- **The UTGD Critique:** Although intersectionality correctly highlighted that a single story of "womanhood" is insufficient, its post-modern execution led to the severe *fragmentation of social solidarity*. 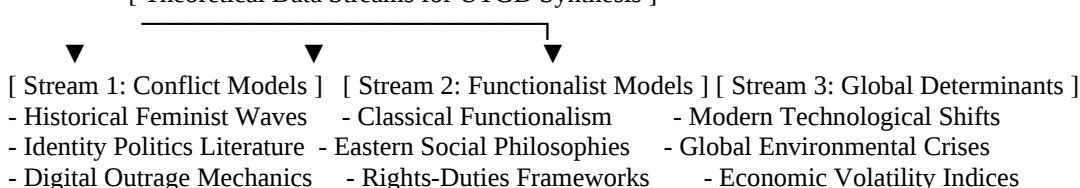

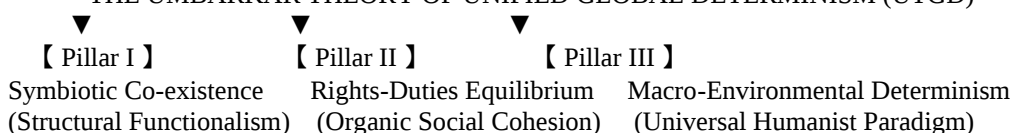
