



# BREAKING THE CODE: SECONDARY STUDENTS' PERCEPTION ON THE PITFALLS OF LEARNING ENGLISH GRAMMAR

## CHAPTER 1

### Introduction

A key element of language education, secondary English grammar instruction is essential to students' overall linguistic competency and academic achievement. Being proficient in English improves students' chances in both the job market and higher education, as well as facilitating effective communication in an increasingly globalized society. But learning grammar has grown to be a difficult task with many obstacles that might make it difficult for students learn due to its complex and often irregular rules, leading to confusion and frustration in their language acquisition journey. English grammar has a pivotal position in language learning. It is also considered the basis of a series of language skills (listening, speaking, reading, and writing) (Andriani, A., Yuniar, V. D., & Abdullah, F. (2021). English language learners often find themselves grappling with the complexities of grammar. While they understand its importance, they frequently encounter frustration in their learning journey, particularly when grammar instruction feels dry and ineffective.

Moreover, English has solidified its position as the global *lingua franca*, influencing various aspects of human life, from education and business to technology and culture. As a result, English language proficiency has become a significant global concern, particularly in non-native English-speaking countries. A key component of English language learning is grammar, which provides the structural framework for effective communication. However, teaching and learning grammar can pose numerous challenges for educators and learners worldwide (Celce-Murcia & Olshtain, 2020).

When a message is relayed with correct grammar, it is easier to understand the purpose and meaning of that message. There's a consensus that the Filipinos' mastery of the English language has become the country's biggest edge in the global job market. Surprisingly, a survey conducted by the researchers revealed that more and more Filipinos can neither converse nor understand English. This is an indication that English proficiency in the Philippines had a significant drop in a few years (E. C. H. C., & Tan, M. J. (2020).

At the local level, most learners would find grammar boring since learning grammar is mostly based on the teacher's lectures and

assigned homework. It is also reported that students show limited retention in listening to pure talk and discussion (E. C. H. C., & Tan, M. J.(2020). As Filipino educators, we have witnessed first-hand the decline in English proficiency among our students. Despite the language's significant role in our globalized world, many students struggle with grammar, finding it tedious and irrelevant.

While numerous studies have investigated the difficulties of learning English grammar worldwide and within the Philippines, there's a crucial need for deeper understanding of how these challenges manifest in our own classrooms. This knowledge can empower students, to become active participants in learning journey and contribute to the development of more student-centered and culturally relevant approaches to English language education in the Philippines.

### Significance of the Study

This study holds significant value by prioritizing the student voice. By directly involving secondary students in identifying the challenges they face in learning English grammar, it empowers them and provides crucial insights for educators. Even experienced English lecturers may face difficulties in explaining grammar to students (Kumayas & Lengkoan, 2023). This student-centered approach can inform the development of more effective teaching methods, address specific learning gaps, and enhance student motivation. Furthermore, the findings can contribute to evidence-based decision-making in curriculum development and policy, leading to more effective and culturally relevant approaches to English language teaching in the Philippines. Ultimately, this research has the potential to significantly improve the English language learning experience for secondary students by fostering a deeper understanding of their challenges, informing more effective teaching practices, and ultimately improving learning outcomes.

### Statement of the Problem

This qualitative study explores the challenges of teaching English grammar in secondary students, focusing on secondary teachers' perceptions. In particular, the following questions will be addressed by this study:

1. What are the specific challenges and difficulties encountered by secondary students in learning English



grammar, particularly from their own perspectives and experiences?

2. What are the secondary students' perceptions on the effectiveness of student-centered teaching approaches?

By addressing these objectives, this study aims to provide valuable insights into the difficulty of learning English grammar, contributing to the development of effective teaching practices.

**Theoretical Lens**

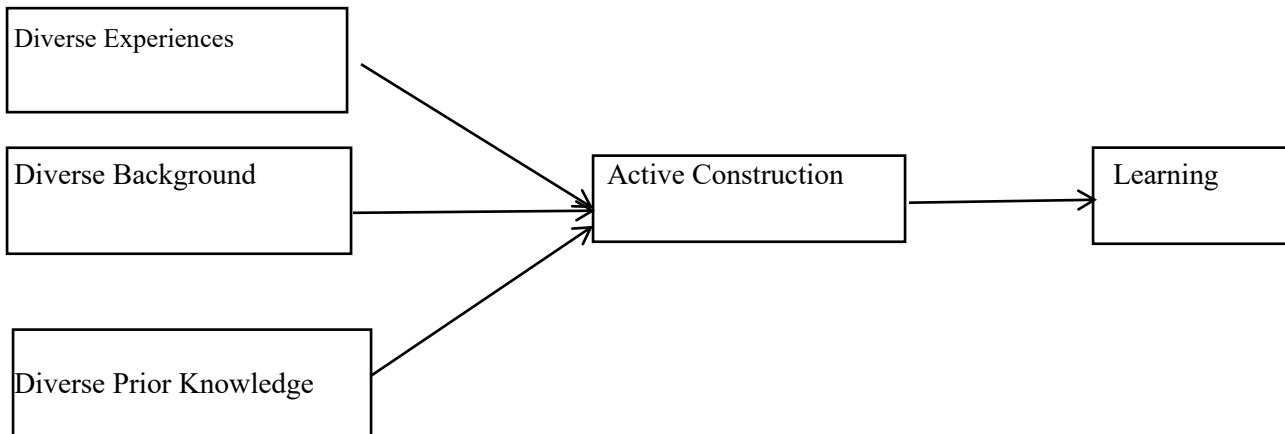
The section presents the theories about the central phenomenon under study. It explains the theories and its connection to the study at hand.

By viewing learners as active participants in the learning process, this perspective acknowledges the diverse experiences, backgrounds, and prior knowledge that secondary students bring to the English classroom. By adapting a constructivist lens, this study can gain valuable insights into the unique challenges and perspectives of Filipino secondary students in learning English grammar. By understanding their existing knowledge, experiences, and learning styles, educators can develop more effective and engaging teaching strategies that cater to the diverse needs of their students, Ormrod, J. E. (2019).

By adapting a constructivism perspective, this study aims to contribute to a deeper understanding of the challenges and opportunities in learning English grammar.

**CHAPTER 2**

**Methodology**

**Research Design**

This study will use descriptive qualitative research to explore the lived experiences of secondary students' perceptions on the challenges of learning English grammar. Qualitative research is a type of research that explores and provides deeper insights into real-world problems. Instead of collecting numerical data points or intervene or introduce treatments just like in quantitative research, the qualitative approach has interviews, observations and document analysis as data gathering method (Muzari, T., Shava, G.N., & Shonhiwa, S. 2022). For this study, a qualitative design, descriptive approach will be adopted, particularly through the use of interview questions, as it enables the researchers to ask several open-ended questions that look at the participants' lived experiences. Through this approach, it is possible for the researchers to deeply engage and interact with student's experiences through interviews.

**Locale of the Study**

This qualitative study is set in a secondary education context, focusing on secondary students in Sta. Cruz National High

School, Talicud, Island Garden City of Samal. This public secondary school offers Grades 7-12 and has an approximate student enrollment of 635. Sta. Cruz National High School was selected as the locale for this study due to its representativeness of public secondary schools in the Philippines. Conducting the research within a single school allows for focused data collection and analysis within a specific educational context.

**Sample and Sampling**

This study will utilize a purposive sampling method in selecting the participants of the study to gather information. The reason for purposive sampling is the better matching of the sample to the aims and objectives of the research, thus improving the rigour of the study and trustworthiness of the data and results (Campbel, et al). The participants will be selected based on their particular knowledge, to share their knowledge and experiences with the researchers. The sample will be purposive, and the participants will be selected through the snowball and convenient technique.

Guetterman noted an average sample size between eight and thirty-one in educational research. Similarly, five to twenty-five participants are suggested as adequate for phenomenological



studies by Creswel (Sarfo, J. O., Debrah, T., Gbordzoe, N. I., Afful, W. T., & Obeng, P. (2021) for saturation of data to fulfill the study's goal. In this study, the sample consists of 5 secondary students selected from Sta.Cruz National High School.

### Research Instrument

In this study, the research instrument that will be used to gather data is an interview guide for in-depth interviews (IDI) as this provides participants with the opportunity to fully describe their experiences. This method of data collection will be chosen to allow the participants to share their own stories in their own words, rather than being forced by pre-established lines of thinking. Interviews are a staple method used in qualitative research. Data collection can be conducted in several ways, of which face-to-face interview is considered to be the gold standard (Saarijärvi, M., & Bratt, E. L. (2021).

A well-crafted semi-structured interview guide includes predetermined questions while allowing flexibility to explore emergent topics based on the research question. In order to collect rich interview data, researchers must attend to key elements before, during, and after the interview (Eppich, W. J., Gormley, G. J., & Teunissen, P. W. (2019). In the context of this study, the method enables the researchers to collect unstructured data, investigate participant thoughts, feelings, and opinions about a specific topic, and delve deeply into personal and often sensitive matters. Several questions relevant to the main research issue will be included in the instrument. The research instrument will undergo validation. It is crucial for the researcher to obtain critical feedback from content specialists in order to establish legitimacy for the data collection instrumentation. The research adviser and panelist will assist in reviewing the data collection procedure and product.

### Data Gathering Procedures

For this study, a combination of self-administered surveys and structured interviews will be employed as data collection methods. These methods will allow for a comprehensive gathering of information from participants.

1. Validation of Interview Guide. Checking the interview guide is crucial in qualitative study to make sure the data gathered is reliable and valid. The checking process, using expert review and test runs, makes sure the questions are clear and good at meeting the study goals. This boosts the study's trust by laying a strong base for gathering and analyzing data.
2. Asking for permission to conduct a study. Getting permission for a research study is key for ethical reasons, getting to resources, making sure findings are legit, sticking to rules, and making good bonds with people involved. This step makes sure the study is done right, helps it go smoothly, boosts its trustworthiness, and builds trust between the researcher and others involved, making the research more solid and well-received in the end.

3. Seek for participant consent. Asking for a person's okay to join in a study is key to respect their choice, meet moral duties, grow trust, stick to the law, and make sure the study's results are sound and true. This step lets people choose wisely if they want to take part, showing the study team cares about keeping them safe and keeping the study honest and strong.
4. Look for a conclusive place. Choosing the right place for an interview is very important for various reasons. It helps to reduce distractions, maintain confidentiality, establish a good relationship with participants, ensure quality of data, follow ethical guidelines, and maintain consistency in the research. Providing a calm, private, and comfortable setting allows participants to share their thoughts and insights more effectively, encouraging open discussions and improving the overall reliability of the study.
5. Interview Process. Interview process involves preparing an interview guide, establishing a comfortable setting, obtaining informed consent, building rapport, using probing techniques, documenting verbal and non-verbal cues, transcribing interviews, and engaging in reflexivity to refine the approach and gain a deeper understanding of the phenomenon under study.

### Data Analysis

After the interview with each of the participant, the preliminary data analysis was made. The objectives of preliminary data analysis are to edit the data to prepare it for further analysis, describe the key features of the data, and summarize the results, Blischke, Wallace, Karim, M.R. & Murthy, D. (2011). However, it was only after the completion of the interviews that the transcriptions were made following these steps:

1. The data was organized into a table for easier analysis.
2. Responses were systematically coded to identify recurring themes and patterns.
3. Key themes identified include: learning experiences, attitudes toward grammar, impact of grammar learning and importance of grammar.
4. Based on the codes, key themes were identified and categorized.
5. The coded data was analyzed to understand participant perspectives on grammar learning.

### Ethical Considerations

It is good to have a paper that synthesizes effective strategies to enhance ethics in a much more practical way. Research ethics is important in ethical practices and to the implementation of practical considerations before, during, and after data collection in qualitative research (Wa-Mbaleka, S., 2019). Therefore, the researchers will observe and follow ethical standards in the conduct of the study. Here are the key ethical considerations that should be addressed in this study:

1. **Informed consent.** Before participation, participants will about to inform about the purpose, procedures, risks, benefits, and their rights. Moreover, this information



consent will be collected for participants at the age of 18 and above. This is necessary as an expression of their voluntary participation in the study. Additionally, permissions were sought from them for the recorded interview session. Researcher will ask the school principal and parents if they will agree to conduct the study.

2. **Privacy and Confidentiality of Information.** All the participants of the study will be protected in matters of privacy and confidentiality. The data collected from them will be kept as confidential, no names were obtained, and their participation will not be disclosed to anyone outside of the research proponent. The information will collect from this research is not revealed and is protected. After the completion of this upcoming research, all data stored in the hard drive will immediately remove. In the same manner, all printed copies of the collected data and information will also dispose and shredded.
3. **Voluntary Participation.** Participation in the study should be entirely voluntary. Teachers should be made aware that they are not obligated to participate and that their decision will not affect their professional relationships or evaluations.
4. **Non-maleficence.** Researchers should avoid any actions that might harm the participants. This includes being sensitive to the emotional or psychological impact of discussing challenges related to teaching grammar. Researchers should create a supportive environment where teachers feel safe to express their thoughts.
5. **Respect for Participants.** Participants should be treated with respect and dignity throughout the research process. This includes acknowledging their expertise and experiences in teaching grammar and valuing their opinions.
6. **Transparency.** Researchers will transparent about their intentions, methodologies, and potential biases. Clear communication with participants and the broader community fosters trust and accountability.
7. **Cultural Sensitivity.** Understanding and acknowledging the cultural backgrounds and contexts of the participants is crucial. Researchers should be aware of the diverse experiences and perspectives that may influence teachers' perceptions about grammar teaching.

8. **Risk, benefit and safety.** The participants of the study will submit themselves to the study are free of risk and safe all throughout the conduct of the study. The participants will also access the results of the study anytime they would like to. To protect the anonymity of the participants during the FGD and IDI, the will researchers inform in advance that their identity was concealed. To validate the findings of the study, participants will be asking to affirm it using a member checking form.
9. **Justice.** Fairness in participant selection and treatment will be observe. Efforts will made to ensure equitable representation and to avoid exploitation or harm. After the interview, participants will give token of appreciation.
10. **Confirmability.** It focuses on the objectivity and neutrality of the research process, ensuring that findings will not influence by the researchers' biases or preferences. Personal biases are mitigated by peer debriefing, having an external reviewer, and constant guidance from the adviser. The researchers acknowledged their subjectivity and actively engaged in critical self-reflection throughout the research process, promoting objectivity and confirmability.

### CHAPTER 3

#### RESULTS AND DISCUSSION

The first step in any qualitative analysis is reading, and re-reading the transcripts.

At this stage, we make notes and jot down early impression. Transcription before the coding process is an essential process for data analysis and even with meticulous detail (Parameswaran, U.D., Ozawa-Kirk, J.L., & Latendresse, G. 2020). In addition, coding reduces lots of data into small chunks of meaning. There are different ways to code and the method will be determined by students' perspective and research questions. Deductive and inductive codes are generated for breadth and depth exploration of the research topics, respectively. Assigning the segments of texts and transcripts is deductive coding while inductive coding begins with data, making segments and categories, and generating relevant codes (Bihu, R. 2024). Answers of the students were collected and analyzed by means of thematic analysis. This method is principally concerned with the identification of patterns which are then reported as researcher-generated themes (Lochmiller, C. R. 2021).

Teachers should use a mix of activities, like games, reporting with continuous English and speaking skill in terms of fluency. So all types of learners can benefit. It's also important to encourage students to ask questions and not be afraid of making mistakes, as this helps them learn faster.
P2	Honestly, I don't have any suggestions because the teachers here teach really well in proper English. Though I would like to make students to speak in English so they could enhance their skills more.
P3	Mag-aral kang Mabuti sa salitang Ingles kung ano ang tamang gramatiko nito. Magsikap at magpursigeat huwag kailanman susuko.
P4	My suggestions to this is to practice, learned and because it can give them motivation and confidence.
P5	More motivational activities that can enhance our grammar.



Table 1 is the data after the transcribing each audio tape verbatim. We did not omit any word or statement from the transcripts of the interview and considered each phrase equally relevant.

### Summary of Findings

The findings suggest that prior language learning experiences can both facilitate and hinder English grammar learning. Participants reported that comparing and contrasting grammatical rules across languages was helpful, but also acknowledged challenges arising from differences and inconsistencies between languages.

Common grammatical challenges included difficulties with English tenses, particularly past perfect, and confusion with homophones and homographs. Moreover, participants employed various learning strategies, including active learning techniques (e.g., practicing exercises, watching videos), engaging with authentic materials (e.g., movies, books), and utilizing the support of teachers and classmates.

Successful grammar learning was found to significantly boost confidence in using English for communication. Participants emphasized the importance of clear explanations from teachers, constructive feedback, and opportunities for collaborative learning. They also highlighted the need for engaging instructional methods that incorporate real-world scenarios and opportunities for authentic communication.

Finally, the findings suggest that individual learning styles and cultural backgrounds can influence the learning process.

In summary, the findings underscore the multifaceted nature of English grammar learning, highlighting the importance of considering individual learner needs, providing effective support, and creating engaging and relevant learning experiences.

### Conclusions

This analysis reveals that English grammar learning is a multifaceted and dynamic process influenced by a variety of factors, including prior language learning experiences, individual learning styles, cultural background, and the quality of instruction. While challenges such as tense confusion and homophone difficulties were commonly reported, participants

demonstrated effective learning strategies, such as active learning and utilizing authentic materials. Successful grammar learning was found to significantly boost confidence and motivation. The findings emphasize the crucial role of teachers, classmates, and supportive learning environments in facilitating successful language acquisition. By incorporating real-world scenarios, fostering collaborative learning, and addressing individual learning needs, educators can create more effective and engaging learning experiences that empower students to overcome challenges and achieve success in English grammar.

### Implications of the Study

This study has several important implications for English language teaching and learning. Firstly, it highlights the need for a nuanced understanding of the role of prior language learning experiences. While prior language knowledge can be beneficial, it can also present challenges. Teachers should be aware of potential transfer effects and be prepared to address any difficulties that may arise. Secondly, the findings underscore the importance of catering to diverse learning styles and needs. Incorporating a variety of learning activities, such as group work, individual practice, and the use of technology, can enhance engagement and cater to different learning preferences. Thirdly, the study emphasizes the crucial role of effective instruction. Clear explanations, constructive feedback, and opportunities for authentic communication are essential for successful grammar learning. Finally, the findings suggest the need for ongoing professional development for teachers to equip them with the knowledge and skills to effectively address the diverse needs of English language learners.

### Recommendation

Based on the findings of this study, it is recommended that English language programs incorporate a variety of strategies to support learners. These strategies should include: (1) **Explicit instruction on areas of difficulty**, such as tense usage and homophone/homograph distinctions, with clear explanations,



examples, and opportunities for practice. (2) **The integration of prior language learning experiences** into the curriculum, recognizing both the potential benefits and challenges. (3) **The use of diverse teaching methodologies** to cater to different learning styles, such as visual aids, group work, and technology-enhanced learning activities. (4) **The creation of authentic learning environments** that provide opportunities for real-world communication, such as role-playing, simulations, and peer-to-peer interaction. (5) **Ongoing professional development for teachers** to enhance their knowledge of second language acquisition theories, effective instructional strategies, and the diverse needs of English language learners. By implementing these recommendations, educators can create more effective and engaging learning experiences that foster successful English grammar learning for all students.

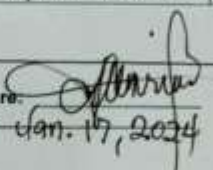

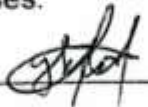
