Therefore, analyzing the educational potential of literary texts through the lens of Uzbek scholarly perspectives is essential for improving the quality of patriotic education and enhancing the overall effectiveness of mother tongue teaching in modern schools. The formation of patriotic feelings among students is considered one of the central objectives of modern education, particularly within the framework of national educational policy in Uzbekistan.
