In particular, the use of interactive methods, project-based learning, and problem-based teaching plays a crucial role in developing pedagogical competencies.

However, the results also reveal that in some cases the implementation of international experience in the national education system remains fragmented. International models are occasionally applied without sufficient adaptation, limiting their pedagogical effectiveness.

Findings indicate that ensuring effective harmonization requires revising curricula and syllabi based on competency-based principles. Analysis of existing programs shows an overemphasis on theoretical knowledge, while practical and reflective components are underdeveloped compared to international standards.

Additionally, the results confirm that integrating international experience into teacher training contributes to teachers' professional growth and readiness for innovation, particularly when mechanisms for continuous self-development and reflection are embedded in the educational process [13].

Overall, the findings demonstrate that harmonizing international experience with the national education model is a systematic, scientifically grounded, and phased process that enhances teacher education quality and competitiveness.

Furthermore, integrating student-centered approaches with knowledge-based traditions enhances independent thinking, problem-solving skills, and research creativity among future teachers.

However, insufficient methodological preparedness among educators limits effective implementation of international approaches, as some educators adopt external features without understanding underlying pedagogical philosophies [11].

The discussion emphasizes the importance of institutional mechanisms, including curriculum reform and competency-based assessment systems, in ensuring successful harmonization.

Overall, harmonization must be continuous and systematic, with teachers' professional growth and reflective capacity at the center of the integration process.
