



A CRITICAL REVIEW ON PHARMACOTHERAPEUTIC EVALUATION OF PRADARARI LOHA W.S. R TO BHAISHAJYA RATNAVALI

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ABSTRACT

Pradarari Loha is a classical Ayurvedic herbo-mineral formulation described in Bhaishajya Ratnavali under Pradararoga Chikitsa Prakarana. It is traditionally indicated in the management of pradara disorders, including śhweta pradara (abnormal vaginal discharge) and rakta pradara (dysfunctional uterine bleeding), which are attributed to doṣa vitiation, dhātu kṣaya, and impaired hemostasis. The formulation is prepared using Kuṭaja kvātha as the base, combined sukshma churna of Mañjiṣṭhā, Śālmali, Pāṭhā, Bilva phala majja, Musta, Dhātakā, and Ativiṣa, along with mineral components like Abhraka bhasma and Lauha bhasma all the ingredients are mixed thoroughly to obtain homogeneous mass from which pills are prepared. This formulation exhibits stambhana (hemostatic), rasāyana (rejuvenative), bālya (strength-promoting), and rakta-pittahara (anti-hemorrhagic) properties. By strengthening the uterus, supporting hematopoiesis, and enhancing metabolic functions, Pradarari Lauha offers comprehensive therapeutic benefits in gynecological disorders.

INTRODUCTION

Rasashastra and Bhaishajya Kalpana represent an advanced pharmaceutical discipline of ayurveda emphasizing the therapeutic application of herbs, metals and minerals. Bhaishajya Ratnavali, describes several formulations for the management of Pradara roga. Among them Pradarari loha¹ mentioned in pradararoga chikitsaparakaranam.

Shweta Pradara is described in ancient Ayurvedic texts such as Sharangdhara Samhita,² Bhavaprakash,³ Yogratanakar.⁴ In Charak Samhita, the management of Shweta Pradara is detailed under the description of Pandura Asrigdara. Commentator Chakrapani explained the term Pandura Asrigdara as Shweta Pradara in his commentary on Charak Samhita.⁵

Pradarari Loha means: “An iron-based formulation that destroys the Pradara (gynecological discharge and bleeding disorders).” Vaginal discharge affects approximately one-third of all women and half of pregnant women, making it a highly prevalent gynecological concern. Studies show the prevalence of abnormal vaginal discharge ranges widely, often reported between 24.6% to over 48% among women of reproductive age, particularly in lower-resource settings. It is heavily associated with infections like Bacterial Vaginosis (23-29% prevalence).⁶

Vaginal discharge is a very common complaint, with approximately one in 10 women seeking care for this issue annually. Vaginal discharge or leucorrhoea is a physiological discharge which changes with the menstrual cycle. It is usually sticky and thick for most of the cycle, but becomes clear, wet for a short period around the time of ovulation.⁷ Abnormal vaginal discharge is characterized by a change of colour, consistency, volume, or odour, and may be associated with symptoms such as itch, soreness, dysuria, pelvic pain or intermenstrual or post-coital bleeding.

Materials and Methods

The present study is a conceptual review grounded in classical Ayurvedic literature. Pradarari Loha was examined with reference to its description in Bhaishajya Ratnavali. Classical references pertaining to Pradara (Shweta pradara, Rakta pradara etc) were sourced from Charaka Samhitā, Suśruta Samhitā, and Aṣṭāṅga Hṛdaya. The collected material was systematically compiled and critically evaluated to assess the formulation in relation to the Samprāpti of Pradara.

Review of pradara

NIRUKTI

- Pradara → Excessive vaginal discharge or abnormal uterine bleeding

**Nidana**

- Dietary Factors: High consumption of Abhishyandi Ahara (foods that cause obstruction in body channels), sweet, cold, heavy, and oily food.
- Lifestyle Factors: Excessive coitus, improper hygiene during menstruation, abortion, and sedentary lifestyle.
- Dosha Imbalance: Vitiating of Kapha and Vata, with a potential impact on Apana Vayu.

Lakshana

Shweta Pradara ⁸(White Discharge): White, sticky (Pichchila), painless, or mild itching (Kandu) in the genital area.

Rakta Pradara (Excessive Bleeding): Excessive, prolonged, or frequent menstrual bleeding, often with pain in the pelvic region, back or flanks.

General Symptoms: Weakness, discomfort, and in severe cases, infertility.

Samprapti

Nidāna sevana →Kapha & Vāta prakopa →Rakta duṣṭi →

Artavavaha srotas duṣṭi →Ati-pravṛtti of Artava/Rakta →Clinical manifestation of Pradara

Chikitsa

Nidana Parivarjana: Avoiding the root causes, especially unhealthy food and habits.

Sthanika Chikitsa :Yoni Prakshalana ⁹ (Vaginal washing) with herbal decoctions (Kwatha) like Lodhra, Vata, and Triphala.

Shamana Chikitsa (Oral Medications): Deepan-Pachan (for improving digestion) using Shunthi (ginger) and Dhanyak (coriander).

Stambhaka (astringent) drugs to check the discharge

Herbomineral formulations are used to treat the pradara roga.

Pathya : Usage of nutritious and easily digestible food, maintaining personal hygiene.

Pradara represents pathological vaginal discharge and bleeding in Ayurveda. Pradarari Loha formulation comprises Kutaja kvātha as the base and powdered drugs like Manjista, shalmali, patha, Bhilva phala majja, Musta, Dhataki, Ativisha, along with Abhraka bhasma, Lauha bhasma. Prepared through trituration and pills prepared. It acts as stambhana (hemostatic), rasayana (rejuvenating), and yoni roga hara (gynecological disorder relieving) properties, widely used in conditions such as śveta pradara, rakta pradara, nila pradara, pita pradara, kukshi shula, deha shula.

Pradarari loha

Method of Preparation

- Take one Tula of Kutaja bark and boil it thoroughly in one Drona of water (16 parts water). Reduce the decoction to one-eighth of the original quantity. Filter the decoction through a cloth and further concentrate it by reheating until it becomes thick.
- Prepare suksma churna of Manjistha, Shalmali, Patha, Bilva-phala-majja, Musta, Dhataki, and Ativisha, and add them to the dense kwatha. Along with these, add Abhraka bhasma and Lauha bhasma, each in the quantity of one Pala.
- Triturate the mixture well in a Khalva Yantra (mortar and pestle) until a homogeneous mass is obtained.
- Prepare kolamatra-sized pills (approximately the size of a jujube fruit), dry them in shade, and store them in an airtight container.

Dosage & Adjuvant

Dose: 1 pill (~5g)

Anupāna: Kuśamūla kvātha or godugdha

Indications

- Shweta pradara
- Rakta pradara
- Nila pradara
- Pitta pradara
- Kukṣi shula
- Kaṭi shula
- Deha shula

Pharmacological Properties

Ayukara (life promoting), Pustikara (nourishing), Balavardhana (strength enhancing), Varnavardhana (improves complexion), Agnivardhana (improves digestion).



Probable Mode of Action of the Formulation

The present formulation is a herbo-mineral compound which has action on Rasa, Rakta, and Artavavaha srotas. The synergistic action of its ingredients contributes to the management of Pradara, abdominal pain, low backache, and generalized body pain.

Action on Doṣha

The formulation predominantly pacifies Pitta and Kapha dosas, which are primarily involved in the pathogenesis of Pradara. Drugs such as kutaja, Musta, Bilva, and Patha, possessing Tikta and Kashaya rasa, helps in reducing excessive secretions and abnormal bleeding. Kushamula and Shalmali exhibit Vata Shamaka properties, thereby it reduces the pain.

Stambhana and Rakta-Saṅgrahaṇa Effect

Ingredients like Dhataki, Salmali, Bilva, Musta are well known for their Stambhana and Rakta-saṅgrahaṇa actions. These properties help in controlling excessive vaginal discharge and uterine bleeding, thus effectively managing Pradara.

Role of Loha bhasma¹⁰

Loha Bhasma is primarily indicated for Rakta dhātu nourishment. In chronic Pradara, vitiated Rakta and deficiency due to excessive bleeding are common. It pacifies Pitta and Kapha, which are the primary Doṣas responsible for Pradara. Loha Bhasma, being bio-assimilable iron, helps in restoring hemoglobin and Rakta quality, thereby reducing systemic weakness and fatigue. Loha Bhasma exhibits specific Stambhana Prabhava, which helps in controlling abnormal uterine discharge and excessive bleeding.

Role of Abhraka bhasma¹¹

Its Kaṣāya-Tikta rasa helps control excessive vaginal discharge and bleeding, while Uṣṇa vīrya improves Agni and digests Āma. It nourishes Rasa, Rakta and Artava dhātu, corrects anemia and weakness.

Dipana-Pachana and Agni-Vardhana

Musta, Patha, and kutaja possess Dipana and Pacana properties, which stimulate Jatharagni and Dhatvagni and help in the elimination of Ama. Proper digestion and metabolism prevent pathological secretions and reduce disease chronicity.

Vedana Sthapana and Anti-inflammatory Action

The formulation alleviates Kukshisula, Katisula, and Sarvangasula by pacifying aggravated Vata dosha. Its anti-inflammatory and analgesic effects contribute to relief from pelvic pain, low backache, and generalized body pain associated with gynecological disorders.

Rasayana and Balya Effect

As described in the classics, the formulation is Ayu Pustikaraka, Bala-varna-Agni-vardhaka. Regular administration improves strength, complexion, immunity, and overall health, thereby preventing recurrence of the disease.

Results

Traditionally reported therapeutic outcomes include arresting excessive vaginal bleeding, reducing abnormal discharge, improving uterine tone, enhancing digestion, building strength, and promoting overall nourishment and vitality.

DISCUSSION

Pradarāri Loha, a classical herbo-mineral formulation described in Bhaiṣajya Ratnāvali, is primarily indicated for Pradara. Its therapeutic efficacy is based on Ayurvedic principles of Doṣha, Dūṣhya, and Srotas involvement. The formulation integrates Loha Bhasma and supportive herbs such as Śālmali, Musta, Dhātākī, Pāṭhā, Mañjiṣṭhā, and Bilva, providing a synergistic effect to control abnormal discharge, alleviate pain, and restore tissue health.

Loha Bhasma, the key mineral component, replenishes Rakta dhātu, corrects anemia, Abhraka bhasma provides Balya and Rasāyana effects and Ativīṣa and Kuṭaja contribute to Doṣha pacification and local hemostasis.

The formulation demonstrates a dual mechanism: herbs provide local hemostatic and anti-inflammatory actions, whereas bhasmas ensure systemic nourishment, tissue rejuvenation, and correction of Dhātu deficiency. This integrative approach reflects the Ayurvedic rationale of combining herbo-mineral components, offering both symptomatic relief and long-term tissue restoration.



Strength of the article

The primary strength of this article lies in its classical authenticity, as the formulation is referenced directly from Bhaiṣajya Ratnāvalī. The formulation has been analyzed through Ayurvedic Samprāpti, integrating the involvement of Doṣha, Dūṣhya, and Srotas, which provides a clear understanding of the disease mechanism. A systematic evaluation based on Rasa–Guṇa–Vīrya–Vipāka–karma further elucidates the therapeutic rationale of the formulation. Additionally, the article emphasizes the herbo-mineral rationale, highlighting the role of Loha Bhasma-based therapy in Rasa Rakta-pradushita Vikaras.

Limitations of the Article

As a literary and conceptual review, the article lacks clinical validation. Variations in Loha Bhasma preparation and the scarcity of contemporary experimental studies limit the ability to establish an objective correlation between classical theory and modern evidence.

CONCLUSION

Pradarari Loha is a specialized Ayurvedic herbo- mineral preparation used for menstrual regulation, anemia management, and uterine health. Its unique combination of loha bhasma and abrakā bhasma with uterine tonics-balanced rasa, virya, and vipaka -contributes to its efficacy. Modern studies substantiate traditional claims, highlighting its potential with fewer side effects than standard iron supplements. For safe, personalized guidance. making it highly beneficial in conditions like pradara and related disorders.

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
