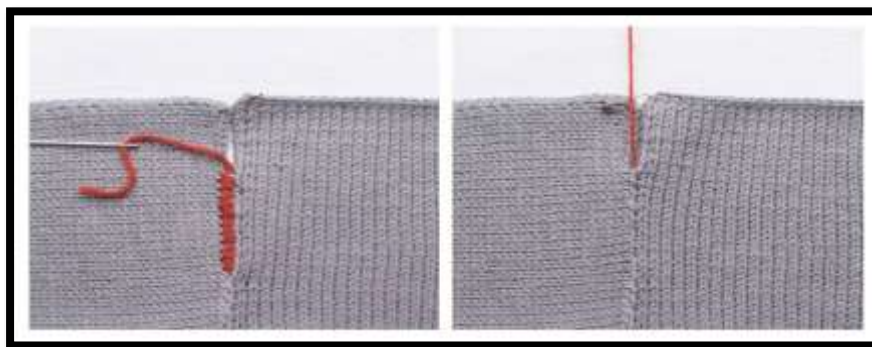

#### Stitching

The act of creating the connections between pieces of fabric by stitching forms the basis of clothing manufacture and lending additional strength and decoration.



(Stitching)

- Running stitch – Simple in-and-out stitch; basic sewing.
- Back stitch – Strong, continuous stitch; good for seams.
- Basting stitch – Long temporary stitch; easy to remove.
- Pick stitch – Tiny, almost invisible stitch for finishing.
- Invisible ladder stitch – Hidden stitch to close seams neatly.
- Whip stitch – Loops over edges; joins fabric edges.
- Catch stitch – Zig-zag stitch; used for hemming.

#### Seaming

A technique in which the different pieces of fabric are stitched together to create form and connect different areas.

### Layering

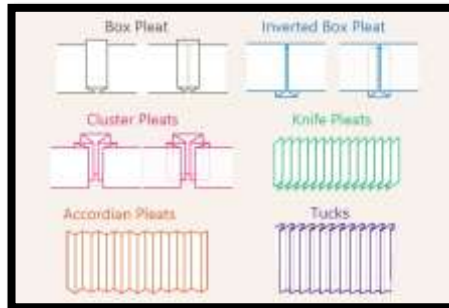
The technique in which several layers of fabric are added to create more complex textures.

### Pleating

The process of folding fabric to create repeating patterns that generate interesting volumes.

These methods work together to produce techniques for making connections, creating arrangements, and giving shape to different types of material, providing practical functions such

as strength, support, and flexibility, while also lending a certain aesthetic appeal through texture, depth, and pattern.
